Don't call it a memorial

Family organizes an American Brain Tumor Association benefit for mom

EAST ISLIP — Refusing to give up hope, Rose DiGangi, who is currently battling a brain tumor, and her family have decided to fight the disease together, and for all of the others the life-threatening ailment inflicts.

Rather than standing idle by her side, DiGangi's family has, in just over one month's time, organized a fundraising 5K run and festival to celebrate their mother's life. The event is also a means for the

DiGangi children to fight the disease as their mother does by raising an expected \$40,000 for the American Brain Tumor Association (ABTA) to fund further research. Scheduled for Sunday, Aug. 12 at the

Fire Island Hotel and Resort on Cayuga Street in Ocean Bay Park, Fire Island, the daylong fundraiser will begin with a 5K run at 10:30 a.m. Following the morning race, the

DiGangis and the Fire Island Hotel and Resort will host a festival that will be filled with food provided by the Irish Coffee Pub, raffles, and live music by a Fire Island staple, Johnny "Irish" Borland and Dan Lauterman. "My mom loves gardening and

"My mom loves gardening and nature, so what better place to have this event than Fire Island?" asked Anthony DiGangi, 28, whose family has lived in East Islip for the past 40 years. "The scenic and family-friendly Ocean Bay Park of Fire Island was a natural fit and prime location to host the 5K and festival." he added.

Aside from the beautiful locale, Fire Island was also chosen as the fundraising site due to the long-lasting and per-

sonal relationships the family has developed with the Ocean Bay Park community during the past 15 years. Both John and Anthony DiGangi

spend their summers working as bar-

tenders at the Schooner Inn. The pair also served the Fire Island Ferries throughout their teenage years; the Bay Shore-based ferry company has donated 200 passenger tickets, freight usage, and a cash contribution for the event. With organizing efforts beginning as

early as June 10, the DiGangis have already come close to registering their maximum allotment for runners, 300, and are expecting hundreds more to join in for the festival. "It's unbelievable, especially for a

first-time event," said ABTA Special Projects Coordinator Angela Allegretti, who, while overseeing ABTA fundraisers across the country, has noticed a growing amount of support for similar, local fundraisers.

The DiGangis decided to work with ABTA because, unlike other organizations, ABTA was the only one that allowed them to earmark the full amount raised to funding research.
